Introduction

Our firm, Smart Money Group, LLC, is registered as an investment adviser with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you to understand these differences. Relationships and Services

What investment services and advice can you provide me?

Services: We offer investment advisory services to retail investors. These services include wealth management which is a combination of financial planning and investment management. We may also offer financial planning as a stand-alone service. We work closely with you to identify your investment goals, objectives, risk tolerance, time horizons, and financial situation to create a portfolio strategy to develop an investment approach.

Accounts, Investments, and Monitoring: We provide services to individual, joint, retirement, trust, and estate accounts. We primarily use mutual funds, exchange-traded funds, stocks, and bonds in constructing portfolios. We do not make available or offer advice with respect to only proprietary products or a limited menu of products or types of investments. As part of our standard services, we monitor portfolios and securities in accounts on a regular and continuous basis. We also offer to meet with you at least annually, or more frequently, depending on your needs.

Investment Authority: We provide our services on a perpetual and discretionary basis. We execute investment recommendations in accordance with your investment objectives without your prior approval of each specific transaction. Our engagement will continue until you notify us otherwise in writing.

Account Minimums & Other Requirements: We require a minimum account size of \$50,000 for you to open/maintain an account or establish a relationship.

What fees will I pay?

Asset-Based Fees: Our asset-based fees for portfolio management services generally range from 1.50% to 1.20% annually based on a tiered schedule. This fee is collected on a quarterly basis and calculated as a percentage of the value of the cash and investments in your account[s] that we manage. This presents a conflict of interest as we are financially incentivized to encourage you to place more assets in your advisory account as you will ultimately pay more in advisory fees.

Hourly Fees: Our hourly fees for standalone financial planning range up to \$350 per hour. Hourly fees for this service will be determined on a case-by-case basis and will be detailed in the signed agreement. Hourly fees are negotiable based on the nature and complexity of the services to be provided and the overall relationship with us. We provide you with an estimate for total hours and overall costs prior to engaging us for these services.

Fixed Fees: Our fixed project-based fees for standalone financial planning range up to \$50,000. Fixed fees for this service will be determined on a case-by-case basis and will be detailed in the signed agreement. Fixed fees are negotiable based on the nature and complexity of the services to be provided and the overall relationship with us. We provide you with an estimate of the total cost prior to engaging us for these services.

Other Fees & Costs: In addition to our advisory fee, you will also be responsible for custody fees, account administrative fees, fees and expenses related to mutual funds and exchange-traded funds, and applicable securities transaction fees.

Additional Information: You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying. How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interests ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

Our financial professionals are registered representatives of Calton & Associates, Inc. ("Calton"), a registered broker-dealer. In addition to our services, your financial professional will offer you brokerage services through their separate capacity as a registered representative and will earn commission-based compensation for transactions implemented through Calton. The commissions earned are separate from our advisory fees, which creates a financial incentive to recommend that you implement securities transactions through Calton. You are encouraged to learn more about Calton by reviewing their Client Relationship Summary.

Some of our financial professionals are licensed as insurance agents. In addition to our services, your financial professional may offer you insurance products in their separate capacity as an insurance agent. The fees charged for the implementation of insurance products are separate from our advisory fees, where your financial professional will earn commission-based compensation for the implementation of an insurance product. Therefore, there is a financial incentive to recommend that you implement insurance through our financial professionals.

Our firm is under common control with an affiliated accounting firm, Briscoe & Associates LLC ("Briscoe"). From time to time, our supervised persons may recommend the services of Briscoe in relation to the financial planning and consulting services we provide to clients. This presents a conflict of interest since our personnel have a financial incentive to recommend the services of Briscoe in order to generate additional compensation for our affiliated accounting firm.

We will recommend that you open your account with a specific custodian, where we maintain an institutional relationship and receive economic benefits. The receipt of economic benefits presents a conflict of interest and can influence our recommendation of the custodian to you. However, you ultimately decide where to open your accounts. Choosing a different custodian may result in the loss of quality of service and/or ability to obtain favorable prices.

How do your financial professionals make money?

Our financial professionals are paid pursuant to a combination of salary and a bonus structure. The bonus structure takes into consideration factors such as the amount of client assets they service, new clients obtained and/or an increase in client assets supervised by the professional, the time and complexity required to meet a client's needs, and the revenue the firm earns from the financial professional's advisory services recommendations. This means financial professionals have an incentive to increase the asset size in the relationship or solicit new business in order to increase their overall compensation.
