Item 1. Introduction.

ISF Global Capital Inc., doing business as Velaris Wealth Management is registered with the United States Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you to understand the differences.

Item 2: What investment services and advice can you provide to me?

Velaris Wealth Management provides investment management services to retail investors. Generally, investment management services clients also receive financial planning services. We do not provide financial planning services on a standalone basis. We tailor your investment management services to match the investment objectives, financial needs, and other information which you provide to us. We monitor the holdings and performance of your investment management services account on an ongoing basis. When providing financial planning services to investment management services clients, we continue to review any provided recommendations as part of the ongoing provision of investment management services. We provide investment management services on a discretionary basis pursuant to authority granted to us in your client agreement. Pursuant to this discretionary authority we are authorized to determine which securities are bought and sold, the total amount to be bought and sold, and the costs at which transactions will be affected. We generally do not limit the types of investments we utilize for clients. We primarily employ passive investment vehicles such as exchange traded funds in developing investment strategies for clients. Utilized exchange traded funds include exchanged traded funds that invest in cryptocurrency related assets. We also utilize registered mutual funds, equity securities, corporate bonds, state and local municipality fixed income instruments, US government and agency securities and private funds/alternative investments if we determine such investments fit within a client's objectives and are in the best interest of the client. We do not impose account minimums for new clients. Regardless, we reserve the right to accept or decline a potential client for any reason in our sole discretion.

Item 3 (part 1): What fees will I pay?

For investment management services we charge an asset based fee, which is billed on a monthly basis. For an asset based fee, the more assets that are in a client's advisory account, the more a client will pay in fees. Therefore, we may have an incentive to encourage clients to increase the assets in his or her account.

In addition to our fees you will be responsible for other fees and expenses, such as transaction charges and fees/expenses charged by any custodian of your account, mutual fund, exchange traded fund, and any taxes or fees required by federal or state law.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Item 3 (part 2): What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide to you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means. For instance, we receive various benefits and services from the custodian that we recommend to you. Item 3 (part 3): How do your financial professionals make money?

Our financial professionals are paid pursuant to participation in firm profits as owners of the firm or pursuant to a percentage applied to the fee revenue generated by the client accounts they services. Financial professionals compensated pursuant to their ownership in the firm or pursuant to a percentage applied to the fee revenue generated by the client accounts they service are subject to a conflict of interest due to the fact increases in firm or client account revenue may lead to increases in financial professional compensation.
